Annotatsiya

Ushbu maqola Robert Luis Stivensonning Xazina oroli asanda o'smirlar obrazini, xususan, bosh qahramon Jim Xokinsni tahsil qiladi. Jim yoshlik sarguzashtlarining arxetipi sifatida qiziquvchanlik, jasorat va ma'nnaviy o'sish kabi universal fazilatlari o'zida mujassam etadi. Aralash metodlardan foydalangan holda olib borilgan ushbu tadqiqotda Stivensonning viktoriyalik ijtimoiy-madaniy kontekstda o'smirlikni qanday tasvirlagani matlini dalillar asosida tahsil qilinadi. Natijalar shuni ko'ssatadiki, Jimning obrazi o'smirlik shaxsiyatining murakkab tomoniarini aks ettiradi, ya'ni yoshga xos shoshqaloqlik va mas'uliyatni shakilantirish jarayonini muvozanatlaydi. Tematik elementlarni miqdoriy kodlash va narrativni sifat jihatidan tahsil qilish orqali ushbu tadqiqot Xazina oroli asarini o'smirlikning adabiy tasviri bo'yicha asosiy matn sifatida o'rganadi. Muhokamada ushbu topilmalar viktoriyalik ideallarning tushunilishi va zamonaliviy adabiyotda o'smirlar obraziga ta'siri bo'yicha ahamiyati ko'rib chiqiladi.

Аннотация

В данной статье исследуется образ подростков в романе «Остров сокровищ» Роберта Льюиса Стивенсона, с акцентом на главном герое, Джиме Хокинсе. Как архетип юношеского приключения, Джим воплощает универсальные черты, такие как любопытство, храбрость и моральный рост. Посредством количественного кодирования тематических элементов и качественного анализа повествования данное исследование позиционирует «Остров сокровищ» как основополагающий текст в литературном изображении подросткового возраста.
